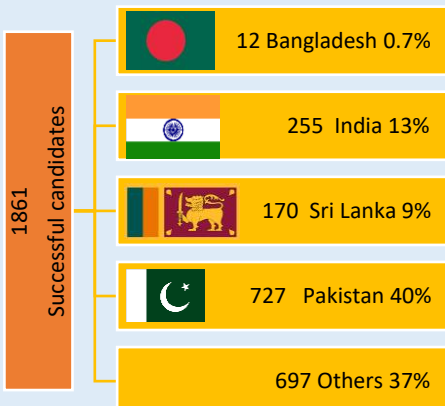

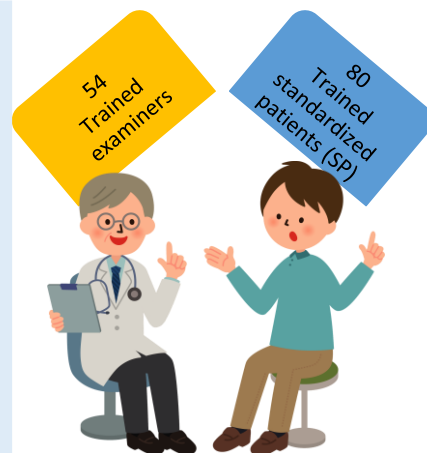


MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR
